## Our final issue at Development stage: LCAP delivered and looking forward

### LCAP, what is that?

The **Landscape Conservation Action Plan** is a tome of a document which is presented to Heritage Lottery Fund at the end of the development stage. It finalises the project plans, shows what has been learnt during development, explains what is expected to happen during the 5-year delivery period and what is anticipated beyond that for each project. Anything relevant to Nenescape from the last two years is included along with a plethora of budgets, job descriptions, maps, surveys and more.

HLF will use this to ensure they have confidence in our scheme and, if so, will give us permission to commence Delivery in autumn of this year. A major and pivotal piece of work, which has been a truly collaborative effort, bringing together the skills and expertise of the whole partnership.

### Mid-term review

HLF provide projects such as ours with mentors and are supportive in helping with LCAP submission. Part of that support is having a mid-term review with both our Mentor and Grants Officer to assess progress and to make sure that we were on-track to produce a comprehensive document.

Amanda Johnson, Project Manager, Alison Cross, Interpretation & Community Engagement Officer along with some board members and delivery partners attended the review on 22<sup>nd</sup> March and were given encouraging feedback. 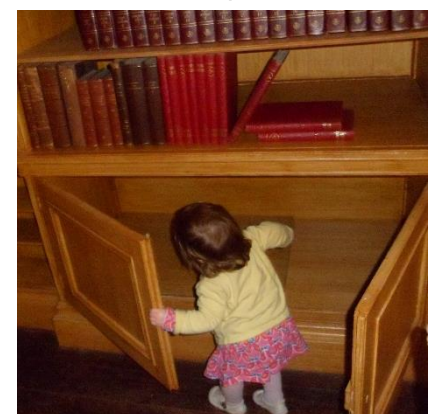
### Annual Nene Valley Tourism Stakeholder Event

## Ice Age to Digital Age, partners selected

This is one of the Nenescape managed projects, made up of a number of individual initiatives headed up by our ICE Officer, Alison Cross. Tenders for filming and digital partners, were procured in January 2017 and two partners were selected to lead on the following projects:

### **Artcodes along the Nene**

Akin to QR codes, the artcodes team at Nottingham University use image recognition technology in the same way but offer so much more. As the name suggests, the code for scanning, directing and subsequently pinging information back is all contained within artwork. No special skill is necessary, it can be as naïve or as complex as the designer wishes, therefore anyone who can use a pen can make their own code.

The beauty of artcodes is that the code/artwork itself can inform the viewer but by using an app another dimension is added; you may receive an augmented reality experience, a link to a website or a stand-alone piece of information.



Pilot workshops were held with partners from the Greenway project. We transferred some of our sketches onto leather.
